Southern Conservation District Operations and Business

District Conservationist Report

Ruby Daniels Holland, NRCS

Ruby Daniels Holland presented the District Conservationist Monthly Report for May and June 2025. A total of 26 field visits were conducted across both offices—12 in Beckley and 14 in Princeton. Conservation planning included 14 plans covering 1,419.3 acres for the Princeton Field Office and 10 plans covering 1,704.7 acres for the Beckley Field Office, with practices implemented under ECP and EQIP programs. Completed practices totaled \$84,171.66 in Princeton and \$36,536.49 in Beckley. Funding obligations included four EQIP contracts in Beckley for \$84,401 and ten EQIP contracts in Princeton totaling \$54,003. Two EQIP applications in Beckley (\$10,960) and one in Princeton (\$133,408) remain pending. Beckley has one AMA preapproved application, and Princeton has one remaining EQIP preapproved application. Ongoing priorities include marking trees for FY24-FY25 FSI practices, completing contract maintenance tasks, and preparing for upcoming deadlines: June 20 for FY26 CSP renewal sign-up and July 1 for FY25 AMA and EQIP Round 1 obligations. Ruby noted the Appalachian Grazing Conference Committee Meeting will be held via Microsoft Teams on June 27, 2025, and encouraged attendance. Updates were also provided on special projects and training, including successful high tunnel workshops hosted by Beth Villers and an upcoming JED Training on July 8,2025 focused on resource concerns and practice selection. Staffing updates noted that José has reported to the State Office in Puerto Rico, where he will serve in a remote IT support role for NRCS; the duration of this assignment remains uncertain.

Administrative Specialist Report

Jesus Nandi Roman, WVCA

Jesus Nandi Roman provided an update on recent invoices related to project work. The invoice for Dave's Fork/Christian's Fork totaled \$5,800.00, and the invoice for Brush Creek totaled \$21,400.00, bringing the combined total to \$27,200.00. Both invoices have been submitted to Jacob Lavender for verification.

A motion was made by Bill Harris to approve the FY26 District Support Allotments as presented, including the following:

Ed Hendrick made a motion to approve the May 12, 2025 Special Board Meeting Minutes; Ron Testerman seconded. Motion carried.

Bill Harris made a motion to approve the May 28, 2025 Special Board/Committee Meeting Minutes; John Farrell seconded. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Bill Harris to approve the April 2025 financial reports as presented. The motion was seconded by John Farrell. Motion carried.

Review/Approval of Accounts Receivable/Aging Summary

Dave Parkulo, SCD

Dave Parkulo provided an update on the current Accounts Receivable and Aging Summary. He reported that the largest outstanding item involves Demo; he has accepted a \$7,000 payment for the bench, following a recent call from the customer. He plans to visit the location in person to collect the payment. The customer had attempted to visit the office the previous day but was unable to meet due to scheduling conflicts. An unresolved balance with Shane Lilly was also discussed. Despite multiple follow-up attempts, payment has not been received. Dave stated that the account may need to be written off if no resolution is reached and recommended that no further business be conducted with the individual until all outstanding payments are satisfied. A

separate outstanding balance of \$200 is still being pursued. Dave also noted that he will follow up again with the Charleston DNR office regarding a delayed process related to work at Plum Orchard Lake. The WVCA-related issue is currently in process and is being handled by Jacob Lavender, with no anticipated concerns. Dave also noted invoices with a few other minor accounts. No major issues were reported.

Following discussion, Steve Johnston made a motion to approve the Accounts Receivable and Aging Summary as presented. Bill Harris seconded. Motion carried.

Conservation Technician Supervisor Report

Dave Parkulo, SCD

All outstanding cost-share practices have been completed, including work in Wyoming and McDowell counties. Remaining invoices are pending but are expected to align with original cost estimates. SCD is starting projects at Jumping Branch, and preparations are in place for upcoming work in the area. Channel maintenance has been completed across all sites except Brush Creek, which is scheduled for fall. Electrical trenching at the district building has been completed, with final breaker installation pending. Payment and documentation for the excavator have been finalized, and fencing materials are being processed.

A detailed discussion was held regarding ongoing stormwater runoff issues impacting district property. The SCD met with representatives from the City of Beckley, the Beckley Sanitary Board, the DEP, and engineering consultants. A short-term fix was agreed upon, involving the replacement of the existing drainage pipe and resurfacing of the parking lot. The sanitary board has acknowledged temporary allowances to divert stormwater, though the current discharge setup is technically noncompliant. Long-term solutions are being explored through grant funding to potentially reroute runoff underground to Cranberry Creek.

The board emphasized that open-channel solutions or gravel alternatives are not acceptable due to liability and federal property restrictions. The DEP identified a mine shaft currently receiving runoff as a potential hazard, and discussions are ongoing regarding ownership and responsibility. It was noted that the district is currently being charged for stormwater runoff despite runoff originating upstream and being funneled across district property. The board discussed the potential of revisiting the terms of payment or imposing a usage fee to upstream contributors. Before any further stormwater bills are paid, the board agreed that a formal discussion and vote should be held to determine whether continued payment is justified.

Motions

A motion was made by Ed Hendrick to approve the cancellation of Jackie Gill's Nutrient Management Contract in the cost-share amount of \$65.00. John Farell seconded the motion. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Steven Johnston to extend the deadline for the High Tunnel Soil Health AgEP practice to May 22, 2026. The motion was seconded by Curtis Murphy. Motion carried. It is noted for the record that Bill Harris, Vice Chair, abstained from the motion due to his participation in the program.

Budget Clarification and Fund Allocation Update

Jeremy Salyer, WVCA

It was clarified that an internal oversight led to \$18,000 being mistakenly intermingled with state funds due to the absence of a designated sub-account. This has since been identified and is being corrected. A separate sub-account will be created and properly coded to ensure these local contributions are tracked independently and do not interfere with the state allocation form or reporting.

All state funds have already been fully expended, and current spending is drawing from local funds. Moving forward, any local contributions will be deposited into the separate account to avoid showing a positive year-end balance in the state fund, which could affect future allocations. The state fund account will be zeroed out as bills are paid but will remain active and available for future use. Any remaining balance in the local account at year-end will carry over and may be redirected or returned to the contributing source if desired.

WVCA, NRCS & SCD Updates:

Watershed Manager South Report

Jacob Lavender, WVCA

An update was provided on Rush Dams 14 and 15. The additional funding request is being processed, with the PSD expected to sign a revised agreement. Once finalized, it will be submitted to the federal level, with plans to bid Dam 15 this summer if funding is approved in time. Regarding Dam 9, there is an issue at a nearby stormwater retention pond, which is causing

backup into the channel. Although the issue is not the district's responsibility, it could become a concern if left unaddressed. The property owners are responsible for repairs, and dam safety officials have been notified. Staff continue to monitor the situation.

The district was informed that the WVU Extension—administered grazing grant (part of the Climate-Smart Commodities program) is no longer active. As a result, any previously requested funds under that program must be returned. No funds were expended, and no contracts were approved before the program ended. WVU Extension may reapply under a future grant cycle, but new rules will prohibit pass-through administration by conservation districts. The university will be responsible for direct administration moving forward.

This item will be added to the next board agenda for formal action.

Progress continues on the federal flood hazard mitigation planning grant covering Mingo, McDowell, Wayne, and Wyoming counties. WVU Extension, Cindy and Sigrid are leading the effort. Recent meetings with county officials helped gather input for the planning phase. This grant, funded through the Department of Homeland Security, is designated for planning only. Upon completion of the plan, the district may apply for construction and implementation funding under future grant cycles.

Area Operations Manager Report:

Jeremy Salyer, WVCA

Jeremy Salver provided brief updates on his report. A copy is provided below.

Supervisor Reports/Approvals:

Approval of District Policy Revisions for 2025-2026:

Bill Harris made a motion to accept the revised policy. Ed Hendrick seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Approval of Plan of Work for 2025-2026:

Ed Hendrick made a motion to accept the revised Plan of Work for 2025–2026. Curtis Murphy seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Site 12 Easement Violation:

An update was provided regarding an ongoing easement violation at Site 12, where a roadway was constructed across the outlet channel without authorization. Despite prior notice sent by certified mail to the current landowner, no corrective action has been taken, and sedimentation in the channel continues to worsen. NRCS has provided specifications for a compliant crossing—twin 12-foot box culverts or a 24-foot span bridge with specified channel elevations—which were shared with the landowner. No response or return receipt has been received. Although long-term drainage improvements may be addressed through future

rehabilitation work, immediate action is needed to address the current obstruction and drainage issues.

Following discussion, Bill Harris made a motion to turn the matter over to the district attorney, John Wooton, to issue a formal letter to the landowner establishing a time frame for completion of the required repairs. John Farrell seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Supervisor Per Diem Discussion: FY25 Closeout:

In accordance with established policy, all supervisor travel reimbursement requests must be submitted prior to the close of the fiscal year. Any expenses not received by the established deadline will be considered untimely and will not be eligible for reimbursement. These unsubmitted expenses will be forfeited, with no exceptions.

Supervisors are strongly encouraged to maintain accurate records and submit all required documentation—such as itemized receipts, mileage logs, and reimbursement forms—in a timely manner to ensure compliance. This policy is in place to maintain fiscal accountability and to ensure that year-end financial reporting remains accurate and complete. Late submissions will not be carried forward or reimbursed from the following year's budget under any circumstances. Supervisors with outstanding expenses are advised to submit their claims well in advance of the fiscal year-end deadline to avoid forfeiture.

WVACD Dues:

John Pitsenbarger, President of the WVACD, addressed the Board regarding continued membership and payment of annual dues. He acknowledged tight district budgets but emphasized the importance of representation at both the state and national levels. WVACD advocates on behalf of districts in Charleston and Washington, D.C., and provides access to grant-funded employees, educational outreach, and promotional support.

The Association is actively pursuing grants—both federal and private—to support conservation districts. Membership also includes eligibility for program reimbursements (e.g., \$150 for hosting area meetings/food), voting rights on organizational bylaws, and participation in scholarships and recognition programs. Pitsenbarger noted that, although some grant opportunities were paused due to funding issues, others are reopening, and member districts are informed as they become available. He referenced the longstanding partnership between the WVCA and WVACD encouraging the Board to renew a usual, meaningful partnership.

Bill Harris made a motion to continue membership with the West Virginia Association of Conservation Districts (WVACD) and to approve payment of the \$5,000.00 annual dues for the upcoming year. Steven Johnston seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Officer Elections:

All current officers expressed their willingness to continue serving in their respective roles. The Board proceeded with the formal election process to confirm each position:

- Secretary: Bill Harris made a motion to close nominations for the position of Secretary. John Farrell seconded. Motion carried. Edgar Hendrick will remain in the role.
- Treasurer: John Farrell made a motion to nominate Curtis Murphy as Treasurer. Ed Hendrick seconded. Steve Johnston made a motion to close nominations; <u>John Farrell seconded</u>. Motion carried. Curtis Murphy will remain in the role.
- Vice Chairman: Steve Johnston made a motion to close nominations to retain Bill Harris as Vice Chairman. John Farrell seconded. Motion carried. <u>Bill Harris will remain in the role.</u>
- Chairman: Steve Johnston made a motion to close nominations to retain Randall Patton as Chairman. Ron Testerman seconded. <u>Motion carried. Randall Patton will remain in the role.</u>

All officer positions remain unchanged for the upcoming term.

Farm Tour Results:

Bill Harris and Jeremy provided an update on the 2024 Conservation Farm Program nominations. Two farms were visited for consideration as the District's Typical Conservation Farm:

- 1. Tim and Sue Ward's farm in Raleigh County
- 2. Jason Tarp's TNT Organics in McDowell County

Although the Wards' farm was a strong candidate, it was determined they are ineligible to compete at the state level due to a conflict of interest—Sue Ward is a current NRCS employee, and despite not being involved in daily operations, NRCS confirmed she qualifies as a close family member. Their farm will still be recognized locally. With the Wards' disqualified, TNT Organics remains the sole candidate for the District's nomination. While the operation is a work in progress, it shows promise, particularly in small-scale Appalachian farming and community outreach. The Board acknowledged Jason Tarp's strengths in education and local engagement but noted that certain aspects of the farm may need further development before competing at the state level. A recommendation was made to provide support and guidance to help the operation become more competitive in future years.

The District also plans to recognize additional farms at the local level, including Steve Dehart's operation in Mercer County. Outreach attempts were made to a farm in Wyoming County, but no response was received. The tour of nominated farms is tentatively planned for the week of July 7, 2025, with final details pending. It was also noted that no food should be served during official judging tours due to conflict of interest concerns, though off-site meals remain acceptable.

Randall Patton moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion was seconded by Steven Josnston and carried. The meeting was adjourned.



The Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative

NACD Technical Assistance Grant


