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MEETING MINUTES August 5, 2025

The monthly meeting of the Potomac Valley Conservation District was held on Tuesday, August 5, 2025, at the Farm Credit Building in Moorefield. The meeting was opened with prayer and the pledge of allegiance. The meeting was called to order at 7:09p.m. by Chairperson, Charlotte Hoover.

<u>Annual Banquet</u> – Grant County to host this year, looking into last weekend in September and first two weekends in October.

<u>Conservation Farmers</u> – Wilding Wooly Farm in Hardy County won first place in the non-traditional category at area level; state level judging for this farm will be August 28th in the morning, time TBD. Alexander Farm in Grant County won second place in the traditional category at the area level.

Youth Supervisors – Layla Shreve: 12 members attend state convention; one member competed in tractor driving competition. Aiden Riggleman is now serving as the Eastern Region vice president at large for the state. Layla was the state star and placement for her SAEs, which were working on her farm and being a youth supervisor. Six members received their state degrees, 10 were recognized for their American degrees. Officers went on their officers' retreat. Have planned their year ahead and went on multiple farm tours and visited the Broadway FFA chapter. Alumni hosted a pool party. Members will be showing livestock at the State Fair as well as showing products that they have grown. Layla will be honorary Commissioner of Agriculture on Sunday. They are starting up practices for fall career development events. 4H in their region has also been very active, a combined team of Hampshire and Mineral competed in the horticulture competition in June and are now practicing for a national competition to be held in Baltimore in October. Hampshire County also has a hippology team going to nationals. Layla added later that Randy Jo Wolford and Grace Ott are both state officers now and from the eastern region.

Emily See: Klover Krusaders Club is going horseback riding in September at Seneca Rocks. William Waddy is now the West Virginia State President; he is from the eastern region and belongs to the Petersburg FFA chapter. Emily is moving on to college on the 22nd and will be majoring in agricultural engineering and minoring in agricultural sciences.

NRCS – $Adam\ Boner$: has been working on the next field day which is looking to be held on September 15th in the evening.

- Lee Haggerty: Hampshire/Mineral pasture walk/field day had about 40 attendees, lasting from 5-8pm and seemed to go very well.
- Sarah Taylor-Goldizen: spoke on the Tri-County Fair Parade, Shawna and Lily designed the float for the parade, they handed out pollinator seed packets and seemed to be a huge hit.
- Jon Bourdon: NRCS will follow up with Army Corps of Engineers regarding the issues at Strickler's property and will continue to support the district. They have fully obligated all their funds for this year, which has been a significant drop from last year, but is giving them an opportunity to get construction on the ground and move forward. It does appear that NRCS and FSA programs are looking very strong dollar wise moving forward. Staffing they have not lost any employees but also have not gained any, but it appears that any reorganization that happens within USDA (NRCS, FSA) is not going to impact West Virginia from the state down.
